This 4-H Leadership Plan is part of the process that will guide you in learning leadership skills that will help you to become a competent, caring, confident, connected and contributing citizen of character.

Who needs to complete the 4-H Leadership Plan Challenge?

Any 4-H member, age 13-18 (4-H Age), who enrolls in the 4-H Leadership project and wishes to develop their leadership skills to their fullest potential. The leadership challenge means just what it says. It is designed to make you think about leadership and challenge you in carrying out a project until completion. The interview portion is to help prepare you for a future job interview. And the best part is, you are able to use everyday leadership things you are doing in 4-H to compete for prizes. Prizes will be awarded to top individuals who carry out the plans to completion. The Leadership Challenge is not connected with Leadership Record Books and is a separate award that will be given out at the Achievement Banquet.

What is a 4-H Leadership Project Plan Challenge?

You enrolled in the leadership project, but now what? This is your chance to decide what you want to get out of the leadership project. For most everyone, the answer is to gain leadership skills. The only way to learn those skills is to put a plan into action. You will "learn by doing." A leadership project is something you provide leadership to. This is more than assisting" or "helping." This should be you "leading."

There are ideas on the last page to help get you started. Think about something you have a passion for. This will lead you to being more involved and more excited about your project. You will not be judged on the selection of your project, but rather on what you do with it -- the impact you make, and how well you put your leadership skills to work. Remember, your project can be big or small, but the key is that you are "leading" not just helping or participating.

What is the Process?

Each member must submit a 4-H Leadership Project Plan to the Extension Office **<u>before their project begins or by April</u>** <u>1st</u> , whichever comes first.

Deadlines to Remember

April 1 - August 31	Put your Leadership Project Plan into Action.
September 1	Submit a Leadership Plan Evaluation to the Extension Office.
September 15	Reference form(s) due to Extension Office. <i>Use the provided 4-H TLP Reference Form.</i> Your reference(s) should reflect people you have developed a relationship with due to your leadership plan. The form(s) needs to be sent directly to the Extension Office to ensure confidentiality. One reference is required, you can seek as many additional references as you wish.
Month of September	Individual Plan Presentations and Interviews- These will be set-up on several evenings and it is up to you to try and be there for this. You will be notified of the dates and sign-up availability.

Worksheet for 4-H Leadership Project Plan- Due Before Project Begins or by April 1

Use the following questions and information to guide you through developing and planning your leadership project. Your project plan should be in an area of your interest—something you have a passion for. It does not have to be 4-H related, but it can be. It can be within your club, school, community, church, other organization, county or state (for project ideas – see last page).

Step One: Needs Assessment

A. Identify an issue in your community that you believe you could change or influence, a hole that you can fill, or a group that needs a leader. (Something you have a passion for).

B. Describe target community/audience What audience(s) will benefit from your work on this project? Your target community/audience may be defined as anything from a small group of individuals to a county-wide effort.

Step Two: Goal Setting

C. Identify how you will involve people in working on your project? *How will you convince them of the importance of this project? Do you need to involve them in deciding what they will do to make changes or will they go along with a plan you have in place?*

- D. Write a goal that can be accomplished this year for your project (short-term)
- E. Identify the ultimate outcome for this project (What do you hope to accomplish in the end the big picture long-term).

Step Three: Implementation

F. Write a plan of action.

List the steps you will take to accomplish your goal. When and how will you recruit and organize people to accomplish what has been set as a goal? Do you need to provide any training in which others in the group might need to accomplish the task?

G. What skills and knowledge do you have or do you need to implement this plan? What else do I need to know about this topic to fulfill my goal(s)? Where can I find this information?

Step Four: Evaluation

H. Evaluation of your progress is very important. How will you evaluate your progress and how often?

Have you met with the people who need to be involved? What tasks have they assumed? Have people done something as a result of your leadership? How close are you to achieving your goal? Do you need to change or add anything to your plan to reach your goal?

Selecting a Leadership Project

One of the more difficult parts of this process may be determining your "project." However, it doesn't need to be difficult. It simply needs to be something you are passionate about and would like to give your time and energy to. If you do not have a passion for your project, you will not enjoy your experience and most likely not have much success.

Your project should be something you "lead." It must involved organizing and leading a group of people (adults or other youth). *A solo citizenship project is NOT a leadership project*.

Here are some past projects from another county to help get you started:

Organize or lead a Swine Clinic Farm Education (where pizza comes from) Presentation to School Group Sewing Workshop Organize a 4-H Club Choir Coach grade school basketball Organize a Day at the Senior Center Teach Leather Crafting - Passing the art of this craft on to the younger generation Write a Newsletter for a Project Collect Books and Cell Phones for a Women's Shelter Put on a Food and Nutrition Day Camp (or any project day camp) Host a car/bike show to raise money Organize a club celebration Serve as a Project Leader Plan and conduct an afterschool program

As you can see from this short list, there is quite a variety – do not limit yourself. You will not be judged on the selection of your project, but rather on what you do with it, the impact you make, and how well you put your leadership skills to work.
